A Note from Paul

Few things bring people together like a wedding, and at the same time the concept of marriage for some people is very polarizing and political.



But let's not get political tonight. We've had enough politics recently to last a lifetime.

When my husband and I got married, it was the summer of 2021. Well, technically we got legally married in May of 2020, but we all remember what was happening at the time. So, we signed the papers and took some photos (outside) in 2020 and had the "ceremony" and party with our friends and family July of 2021 – that magical time when we didn't have to wear masks and there weren't new variants popping up yet.

Our plans for 2020 were scrapped and we retooled to make it all work in 2021. Few people invited and an indoors/outdoors gathering at our friend's beautiful home as opposed to the venue we had set pre-COVID. This very theater was where the rehearsal dinner took place (so all the out-of-town people could finally see it) and everything was set. Food and drinks. Minimal flowers. We treated it just like a show with deadlines and plans so that nothing could catch us by surprise.

Except this wasn't a show - it was a wedding.

July 2021 with a ceremony and photos outdoors in the Georgia heat meant that I was sweating so much that my wedding party had to ice me down with frozen vegetables while fanning me so the sweat wouldn't show up in pictures. Our dog, who was obviously part of the ceremony, almost jumped into the pool in the backyard as we walked down the aisle, and people got so drunk that we ran out of food and ended up ordering pizza for everyone later in the night - before all of us ended up jumping into the pool either fully dressed or in our underwear. All did not go *exactly* to plan but I wouldn't have had it any other way.

The wedding you'll see here tonight is not going to go exactly as planned. They never do, but that's how the best memories are made.

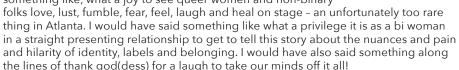

Director's Note

I've been reflecting a lot about community and queer joy as resistance recently. I've also been avoiding writing these director's notes like the plague.

Probably because in October when I was hired, the thoughts I would have outlined here were different. I would have said something like, what a joy to see gueer women and non-binary



But now, in my avoidance to write my director's notes, a thing I normally relish, I have to examine why. Why don't I feel the lure to wax poetic about these things anymore? Why do I struggle to know what to say at all? Even when all of the above still stands... it's because the big *why* of why we are telling this story has shifted for me since October, just as the world has shifted since October.

I will say this, this play, even upon first reading, reminded me why I love people.

Thanks to some deft writing by our playwright Bryna Turner, it reminded me how clever people can be. And creative. And funny. And sexy. And heartbreaking and beautiful.

How sometimes in life we meet people who can miraculously carve out kindness for us, when we need it the most. Even without being asked.

How sometimes when we are tuned in we can see someone fully, whole and incomplete. And we can connect, dead on, with humanity and tenderness and kind, direct honesty and a gentle humor in our hearts.

"The only way out is through" has been a recurring discussion in rehearsals, as we witness Carlo make it through her ex's wedding. Luckily for Carlo, and us, in good times and bad, for richer or poorer, till death do us part, we can find hands reaching out, and we can reach out our own, and go through it together.

And so I feel more grateful than ever for our community. It is such a painful, precious thing to see each other, in our grief, individual and collective, and to hold space (whether via the lyrics of Defying Gravity, or other means), and to take up each other's hands and say 'let's walk through this, together.' Reminding each other to laugh along the way in the face of it all, because as Bryna reminds us in their production notes, "It's a comedy." And because queer joy can never be doused. We're too funny for that, anyway.

I love you. Stay brave. Stay joyful. It is sacred.

Dramaturgy

At the Wedding by Bryna Turner is a piece about love, forgiveness, and retrospection. And hey, while we're "at the wedding," what is a wedding anyway? As we all know, a wedding is an event that unifies a couple together, resulting in loyalty, rings, and tax cuts. But, do we know why weddings are what they are today? It's traditions! Beyond the wedding planning, which the character Eva notes is "exactly as bad as everyone says it is," what makes a wedding more than a ceremony are the activities, events, and words we choose to uphold due to familial, religious,



or personal background. Despite how fun these things are today, you may find the origin of these beloved customs to be rather intriguing, to say the least. Wedding culture can look a little different in queer spaces due to the inherent heteronormativity, but we will dive more into that later. For now, we'll start off with a few wedding staples.



All hail, Queen Victoria! When Victoria held her wedding February 10th, 1840, she not only broke traditions, but started 3 new trends as a result of it. After designing it herself, Victoria stunned the crowd in a delicate all white dress, something uncommon at the time as brides usually wore colors like red, blue, and brown. This immediately elevated the status of what weddings could be; white was much harder to maintain and buy new, making it an expensive choice, but a chic and bold fashion statement. What else was unusual was the

time of day. Wedding's used to be held in the evening hours, but Victoria's was held around 1 PM- the first royal afternoon wedding in 100 years. This made it easy for her wedding to be viewed by anyone and she paraded around town after the ceremony. This gave the notion that weddings were to be an exciting spectacle, setting the precedent that all royal weddings should be this way. And not only were the rides around town cool, but wedding cakes just got a little more interesting to look at, too. Victoria pioneered wedding toppers, having herself and her husband, Prince Albert, made into figurines to sit atop her 3-tier 14-inch English plum cake. Imagine seeing that for the first time! Surely Carlo might respond: "That's a wedding, alright. That's a fucking wedding"!

Although not as romantic, arranged marriages also have a huge part in wedding customs today. Do you know the tradition that it's bad luck to see your partner before the wedding? This started because couples, in many cases, literally never

got to see each other before the wedding. Although the veil has other meanings, a veil was used in this context to make sure the couple really didn't see each other until the bride made it to the altar. Why? Simply put, it was so the groom wouldn't have second thoughts about marrying the bride if he deemed her "unattractive." It was extremely important that these ceremonies went through as they were essentially business transactions. The father walking his daughter down the aisle and handing her off to the husband was in exchange for a dowry. Did this always have to happen? No. But for some families to maintain their livelihood, they had no other choice.

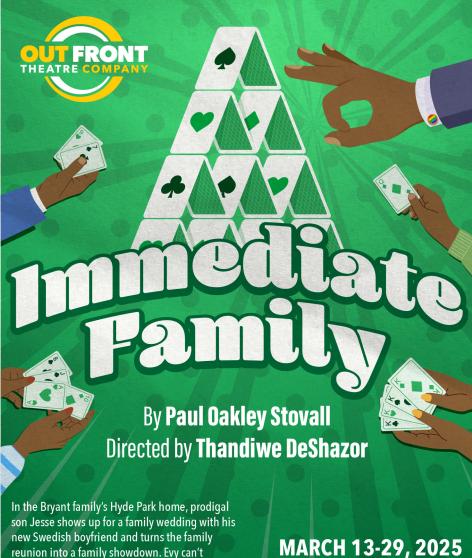
Wow. Some of these traditions are more lighthearted than others, but just like language, they evolve. Everything doesn't mean what it used to. With that being said, much of the culture surrounding weddings is still heteronormative. In the play, Carly mentions the beautiful ceremony, but Carlo dismisses it as "aggressively heterosexual." To avoid the overly straight route, let's consider queer wedding culture and its history. Are there queer traditions? To answer that, let's look into when samesex marriage became legal. June 26, 2015, almost 10 years ago, the Obergefell v. Hodges case enacted marriage equality



nationwide. If you think about a person, 10 years old is still elementary age- queer marriage hasn't even hit the teens yet! conversations and minds our audiences and artists. Theatre's power as a catalyst to spur dialogues goes back thousands of years. Out Front lives to continue that grand tradition of bringing the stories of the LGBTQIA+ people into the spotlight.

LGBTQIA+ Definitions

L stands for Lesbian: Term used to describe female identified people attracted romantically, erotically, and/or emotionally to other female identified people.

G stands for Gay: Term used in some cultural settings to represent male identified people who are attracted to other male identified people in a romantic, erotic and/or emotional sense. Also, a term used to refer to the LGBTQIA+ community as a whole or as an individual identity label for anyone who does not identify as heterosexual.

B stands for Bisexual: A person emotionally, physically, and/or sexually attracted to people of more than one sex and/or gender. This attraction does not have to be equally split between genders and there may be a preference for one gender over others.

T stands for Transgender: A person who lives as a member of a gender other than that expected based on anatomical sex. Sexual orientation varies and is not dependent on gender identity. This term is sometimes used to refer to the gender variant community as a whole.

Q stands for Queer: An umbrella term, which embraces a matrix of sexual preferences, orientations, and habits of the not-exclusively-heterosexual-and-monogamous majority. Queer includes lesbians, gays, bisexuals, transpeople, intersex persons, and many other sexually transgressive explorers. The term is sometimes used as a sexual orientation label instead of 'bisexual' as a way of acknowledging that there are more than two genders to be attracted to, or as a way of stating a non-heterosexual orientation without having to state who they are attracted to.

I stands for Intergender: Intergender people have a gender identity that is in the middle between the binary genders of female and male, and may be a mix of both.

A stands for Asexual: A term describing individuals who do not experience sexual attraction or do not have interest in or desire for sex. Asexuality is different from celibacy, which means abstaining from sex. Asexuality is often viewed as a spectrum – meaning there are varying levels and identities regarding someone's emotional, spiritual and romantic attraction. The best way to refer to the asexual community is to use the umbrella term "ace" or "aces" as in the "ace community," which acknowledges that spectrum.

+ stands for Many Other Identifications

including, but not limited to pansexual, genderqueer, polysexual, agender, androsexual, demisexual, and skoliosexual. We strive to be as inclusive as we can and know we can always improve.
